HOW TO ENTER THE FESTIVAL

- Read the syllabus carefully.
- Make sure you have chosen the correct class or classes.
- Find out the date of birth of any individual solo performers who are under 18.
- Use the on-line entry system, which is run by 'run my festival' on our behalf, by clicking the link on our website, which is http://perthshire-music-festival.org.uk/
- If you do not know the Own Choice details in time for the closing date, you will still have until 1st February to update these details online.
- The closing date for online entries is **17**th **January 2020**. If you realise you have forgotten to submit an entry in time, a late entry may be submitted up to 24th January along with a surcharge of £10 per entry.
- Send in either 1 or 2 copies, as appropriate, of any Own Choice selections, clearly marked as to ownership, Class No. and entrant's name, by 8th February 2019, avoid attaching copies of scripts or music to entry forms, again checking postage costs.
- If you don't have internet access and would prefer to submit paper entries, copies of the Entry Form are available in Concorde Music Shop, Scott Street, or on request from the festival.

ADJUDICATORS & ACCOMPANISTS

Speech: Tish Nicoll

Born in Aberdeen, Tish is a Licentiate of The Guildhall School of Music and Drama. She has a wide range of experience in teaching all age groups in schools, colleges and the business world. Tish now lives in Suffolk, and works freelance. She is visiting lecturer in Vocal Communications in colleges in the UK and in Italy. She also examines for The English Speaking Board (International) Ltd. and was their Chief Examiner for seven years. She has travelled widely both in the UK and overseas lecturing, running workshops, examining and adjudicating. As well as "Voice Over" work for advertising, Tish has television experience as a performer and stage experience as a performer and director. She is also a trained singer, specialising in recitals of poetry and song. From an early age Tish took part in Festivals and well remembers how it feels to be a participant! Now, herself a Festival organiser and an adjudicator member of the British & International Federation of Festivals, she knows the importance of these events and welcomes the opportunities offered to performers of all ages, giving them a platform for their work and a chance to celebrate music, poetry and drama.

Piano, Vocal and General Music: Jonathan Rea

Jonathan studied music at Cambridge, where he sang in the University Chamber Choir and studied piano with Peter Pettinger. He held choral and instrumental awards and won the Rima Alamuddin prize for piano performance. After 10 happy years as Director of Music in Bangor Grammar School, he began a broader career in conducting, producing, writing, composing, arranging and piano accompanying. Regular clients include the BBC, Belfast City Council, a classical soprano and a jazz violinist. He has conducted many programmes for Songs of Praise and directed the Belfast choir for Children in Need. He is also the Principal Examiner for the performing components of A-level Music in Northern Ireland.

Jonathan is Creative Director and Chief Executive of New Irish Arts, whose choir, orchestra and youth choir perform at over 20 events per year. They have sold out Belfast's Waterfront Hall on numerous occasions, and often have over 200 participants in their larger concerts. Jonathan is increasingly in demand as a writer and speaker, occasionally contributing to programmes like Radio 4's Prayer for the Day and Morning Service. An adjudicator member of the British & International Federation of Festivals, he enjoys adjudicating at festivals because he finds it immensely satisfying to play a part in helping people pursue their musical potential.

Woodwind: John Grant

John Grant was born and brought up in Ayrshire, Scotland and began his formal musical studies at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music & Drama (now the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland) in 1977 where his achievements included winning the Governors' Recital Prize, the Chamber Music Prize and the Subject Prize for Flute. Having already been a member of the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain, John continued to establish himself as an orchestral musician by becoming a founder member of the National Youth Orchestra of Scotland, with whom he later appeared as a soloist.

In 1981, John began his professional career first freelancing with the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra, Scottish Ballet and Welsh National Opera, then holding posts with the Hallé Orchestra, Scottish Opera and from 1987 to 2000, was Principal Flute with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra. During this time, John also made many solo appearances, performing concertos by Mozart, Bach, Nielsen and Ibert and was a member of a number of chamber ensembles, including Paragon, the Chamber Group of Scotland and the Allander Ensemble. He also played as guest principal with the London Symphony Orchestra, the Scottish Chamber Orchestra and the BBC National Orchestra of Wales. Throughout his time with the RSNO, John also taught at the RSAMD. Following studies with Maestri Jorma Panula and Benjamin Zander, John now dedicates his working life to conducting and music education, giving him the opportunity to work with many orchestras and bands, including the London Soloists Chamber Orchestra, Camerata Caledonia, West of Scotland Schools Symphony Orchestra, the National Children's Orchestra of Scotland and is currently conductor of both the Strathclyde University Symphony Orchestra and the Kelvin Ensemble (the orchestra of the University of Glasgow), in addition to being an adjudicator member of the British & International Federation of Festivals.

Brass: Kenneth Blackwood

Ken started playing French Horn at Secondary school and gained a place at the Junior RSAMD (now the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland), which he attended from 1977-1980. Ken went on to study with Maurice Temple at the RSAMD and was awarded the Horn prize in both 1983 and 1984, playing Principal Horn in both the RSAMD Orchestra and the National Youth Orchestra of Scotland. After graduating, Ken taught for a year for Grampian Council before being appointed Assistant Principal Horn in the Scottish Opera Orchestra and, two years later, being appointed Assistant Principal Horn in the Royal Scottish National Orchestra. While in the RSNO, Ken taught at the Junior Conservatoire, was head of Brass at Douglas Academy Music School and was Horn/Brass tutor at Glasgow Schools Orchestra, Strathclyde Schools Orchestra, Grampian Schools Orchestra and the National Youth Orchestras of Scotland and helped design the Kinder Horn for Boosey & Hawkes. Ken left the RSNO in 2003 to take up the position of Senior Teacher in East Renfrewshire Music Service and continues to provide 'in-service' training, lectures and masterclasses throughout Britain while continuing to play regularly, adjudicate at festivals and competitions, conduct Croy Brass Band and teach at the Junior Conservatoire.

Percussion: Tim Ridley

Tim studied organ, percussion and church music at the Royal Academy of Music and subsequently undertook compositional PhD research at Brunei University. On leaving the RAM in 1988, Tim toured the world as a session keyboard and percussion player, while a regular band member with *Brotherhood of Man* and *The Supremes*. During this time, he also worked as a peripatetic teacher of drums, percussion and jazz piano at various schools in the south of England. Following 13 years working on the fulltime staff at Marlborough College, including time as Director of Chapel Music and Head of Shell (year 9), in 2009, Time moved to Scotland to become Director of Music at Glenalmond College. Work for ABRSM has taken him all over the UK, with his Scottish base seeing him gaining the opportunity to enjoy music making in Shetland, Orkney and Lewis, and, on the mainland, form Peterhead in the northeast to Stranraer in the southwest. He also examines abroad, with several examining tours to Hong Kong under his belt.

Baton Twirling: Jackie Hogg

Jackie has been involved in the Baton Twirling World for many years, having run Sighthill Allstars from 2002 to 2005, with notable success in Florida at the Twirlmania Championships 2005, culminating in an appearance on the Paul O'Grady Show. From 2006 to 2018, she ran Edinburgh Dynamic Twirlers, competing across England, achieving many awards. Jackie has experience of adjudicating both solos and teams, and we welcome her back to Perform in Perth.

General Music Accompaniments: Robert Melling

Robert moved to Scotland in 1991 with a scholarship to study at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland. Whilst at the RCS, Robert won all the duo and accompaniment prizes, including the Principal's overall prize. He performed regularly both as a soloist and as an accompanist for singers and instrumentalists in master classes with Roger Vignoles, Geoffrey Parsons, John Streets and Martin Isepp at the Britten-Pears School.

Robert's concerto performances include Shostakovich's Second Piano Concerto, Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue and Jolivet's Concertino for Trumpet, Piano and Strings. He has performed both in Britain and on the continent, most notably in the Queen Elizabeth Hall,, the Wigmore Hall, the Academy of St Martin in the Fields, Auckland Palace, Durham, and extensively throughout Scotland and Iceland and has worked with the Chamber Group of Scotland, the BT Scottish Ensemble, Paragon, the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, Capella Nova, Robert McFalls Chamber and the John Currie Singers.

Robert was the official accompanist at the Festival International de Musique et des Arts de Latour de France for 10 years and holds the same position at "Perform in Perth". Radio broadcasts include a recital for Radio 3 at the National Portrait Gallery and work with Radio Scotland. In Europe he performed in a voice and piano recital at the Louvre for Radio France and a Dutch Radio recital in s'Hertogenbosch, repeated in Edinburgh and Glasgow. In collaboration with the Scottish based composer, John Rose, Robert recorded his piano works for "Divine Arts Records" to much critical acclaim and he recently gave a solo recital in the South of France, performing music by Mozart, Debussy, Schubert and Kokkonen and a voice and piano recital in Switzerland.

Robert's opera experience includes work with the RCS, Mananan Opera, D'Oyly Carte Opera, Scottish Opera Connect, British Youth Opera and "Opera Galactica", and he conducted "Carmen" with Opera on a Shoestring and was musical director for their touring production "An Evening in Paris". Robert's theatrical experience has seen him performing with the Citizens Theatre, Cryptic, Suspect Culture and the National Theatre of Scotland with whom, as the musical director for "Wolves in the Walls", he made his US debut on 42nd Street New York. In the same role, he performed with the National Theatre of Scotland at the Edinburgh International Festival for the world premier of "Caledonia". Robert completed a year's contract in 2012 as assistant musical director with the Mamma Mia International Tour and returns to Switzerland each December, in a series of concerts with the Randolphi singeres.

Percussion and Scottish Country Dancing Accompaniments: Maureen Rutherford

Maureen was born into a musical family in Keith, Banffshire. She started dancing at the age of 3 and commenced piano lessons at 4. Mo graduated from Aberdeen University with a BMus (honours) in performance, specialising in piano. Whilst in Aberdeen, she frequently appeared on Grampian TV as both a pianist and a dancer, at the same time featuring regularly in broadcasts of Scottish music by BBC Scotland. After training as a music teacher, Mo taught for many years in the classroom, ultimately as a Principal Teacher of Music at a Dundee school, before joining Perth & Kinross Instrumental Music Service as a piano instructor and accompanist in 2002, quoting it as the best decision ever. Mo, however, has other 'strings to her bow'; she is a former director of music for the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society, a role that has taken her to Europe, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa along with her husband, accordionist Neil Copland. She plays fiddle in Neil's band and is well respected in Scotland and abroad as a performer, teacher and adjudicator of Scottish and classical music, but on particular, has been a major influence in raising the standard of accompaniment for Scottish fiddle music to artistic levels.

N.B. ** denotes a new or altered regulation

All reference to photocopying is in accordance with the Code of Fair Practice (Revised Edition 2012) agreed between Composers, Publishers and Users of Printed Music. All photocopies will be retained and destroyed after the performance.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

- 1. The Festival is for amateurs, except for 'Open' Classes.
- 2. The Committee, at its discretion, may refuse any entry.
- 3. Comments & suggestions for improvement are welcomed and should be made in writing to the Secretary for discussion by the committee.
- 4. The Festival is not responsible for supplying music stands, instruments or any other equipment.

The onus is on the conductor/performer to ensure that the required equipment is available.

- 5. The decision of the Committee in all matters arising out of or not specifically provided for in these Regulations shall be final.
- 6. The Committee may alter, modify or cancel any of the arrangements details in the Syllabus, as it may deem necessary.
- 7. Any timings published in the Programme may be subject to slippage; classes may run behind the scheduled time but will not run ahead of time.
- 8. LOSS OF PROPERTY All attending the Festival are reminded to take care of their personal property: handbags, musical instruments, etc.. Perthshire Musical (Competition) Festival Association cannot accept responsibility for any loss.
- 9. All communications should be addressed to Mrs M.E. Waterston, The Secretary, Perform in Perth, 35 Buchan Drive, PERTH, PH1 1NQ and a stamped addressed envelope enclosed for reply.

ENTRIES

- 10. Entries can be made online by accessing the Festival Website: www.perthshire-music-festival.org.uk Anyone unable to access the internet may send their entries to the Secretary, with payment of the appropriate entrance fee as stated in the Syllabus. In the case of paper entries, a separate entry form must be used for each entry. Additional forms may be photocopied. Applicants who wish to have confirmation of receipt of entries MUST fill out the receipt section at the top right of the entry form and enclose a stamped addressed envelope clearly marked 'Receipt Required'. Late entries will be permitted up to Friday 24th January, 2020, along with a surcharge of £10 per entry. No entry will be accepted after Friday 17th January, 2020, unless it is accompanied by the surcharge of £10 per entry. **
- 11. Winners of solo classes at Beginner, Elementary, Transitional, Intermediate or Advanced level may not compete again in the same class unless they were the sole competitor or unless the mark achieved was less than 85. Pairs of winners of duo and duet classes at Beginner, Elementary and Intermediate levels may not compete again in the same class unless they were the only competitors or unless the mark achieved was less than 85.
- 12. The Committee will decide upon the order in which Classes will be taken and arrange the order of competing, as soon as the list of entries has been closed. Any special requests with regard to timetabling should be submitted in writing along with the entries. Requests will be considered by the timetabling committee, but no guarantees can be given regarding this. A timetable will be e-mailed/posted to every applicant as soon as it is available.

- 13. No form of amplification is permitted in any Class unless otherwise stated.
- 14. Any reference to the age of a performer is taken to be their age on the last day of the festival.
- 15. Any choir, group, orchestra, team etc. entered by a school or group must consist of pupils on the register of that school or group at the time the Festival is held. Classes specifically for schools are intended for schools which provide a general education. 'Perth City Campus' is accepted as a school. Entries are welcome from choirs, bands or orchestras from two or more smaller schools where it is necessary for them to combine in order to allow them to participate. Where appropriate, primary school pupils may perform with the secondary school with which they are linked.

ACCOMPANIST

16. ALL ENTRANTS should note that in all OPEN, ADULT CHOIR AND ADULT VOCAL SOLO CLASSES and classes where the piece/s are ALL OWN CHOICE, the competitor/s may use their own accompanist **OR** the Official Accompanist. **Failure to indicate 'Own Accompanist' at time of entry means that the Official Accompanist must be used.** In ALL OTHER CLASSES including COUNTRY DANCING, the Official Accompanist MUST be used.

OWN CHOICE

- 17. No competitor, except where otherwise stated, may use selected pieces of 'Own Choice' items in more than one class.
- 18. In those Classes allowing 'Own Choice' of test piece/s:
- a) Entries will not be accepted unless full details of the entrant's selected items are shown on the entry form along with the key (where asked for) and the approximate length of playing/performance time.
- b) Where a maximum performance time is indicated in the class description, competitors may be penalised by loss of marks or disqualification if the stipulated period is exceeded.
- c) **No change of test piece/s will be accepted after the closing date for entries** (17th January, 2020). However, if Own Choice details are not known at the time of entry, these details must be supplied by 1st February at the latest.
- d) An original copy is **always** necessary for the accompanist, although photocopies for the accompanist's home study will be accepted on the understanding that the original will be given to the accompanist immediately prior to the performance. Failure to provide an original copy for the accompanist **shall** result in disqualification.
- e) Performers may use internet downloads of own choice music but these must be submitted such that they can readily be used by the accompanist.
- 19. Own Choice Speech. Details of item/s to be performed, along with the author/poet and the name of the character where applicable, must be entered on the entry form (or replacement form) and ONE photocopy must be submitted to the Music Secretary, Mrs M.E. Waterston, 35 Buchan Drive, PERTH, PH1 1NQ, not later than 8th February 2020, clearly marked with the class number and the name of the performer, NOT ATTACHED to the entry form.
- 20. Own Choice Music. Entrants not requiring an accompanist, or the use of the Official Accompanist, should send ONE photocopy of their Own Choice piece, marked ADJUDICATOR, to the Music Secretary, Mrs M.E. Waterston, 35 Buchan Drive, PERTH, PH1 1NQ, not later than 8th February 2020. All items must be marked clearly as to class number and name of competitor, with a separate copy supplied for each performer (even where several competitors have chosen the same item), NOT ATTACHED to the entry form. This includes piano, ensemble, band and orchestral classes. N.B. In the case of ensemble entries, a full score <u>MUST</u> be provided. Failure to send in the required copies by the required date may lead to disqualification.
- 21. Own Choice Music. If the services of the Official Accompanist are required, ONE photocopy of the entrant's selected test piece/s for the adjudicator, in accordance with regulation 19, AND ONE ORIGINAL COPY for the accompanist, in accordance with regulation 17d and 17e, **MUST** be sent to the Music Secretary, Mrs M.E. Waterston, 35 Buchan Drive, PERTH, PH1 1NQ, not later than 8th February 2020. All items must be marked clearly as to ownership, class number and name of competitor, with a separate copy supplied for each performer (even where several competitors have chosen the same item), NOT ATTACHED to the entry form. Failure to send in the required copies by the required date may lead to disqualification.

TEST PIECE

- 22. All Test Pieces are to be performed with accompaniment, unless the copy specifically states otherwise.
- 23. All set Test Pieces are to be performed with repeats unless otherwise stated. Failure to do so may lead to loss of marks or disqualification.
- 24. The prescribed editions of music, and key where specified, must be used by all competitors. The use of other editions will lead to loss of marks or disqualification. Standard pitch will be used in all competitions.

TUNING

25. In all instrumental classes, tuning time must not exceed 30 seconds. In Advanced and Open classes, competitors must do their own tuning.

COMPETITION

- 26. a) Competitor/s (individual or choirs) may compete in more than one class where the syllabus does not specifically state otherwise.
- b) No person will be allowed to take part more than once in any one class except in a duet or group class, where a second entry is permitted, provided a different part is performed.
- 27. No conductor shall sing with his or her choir in competition.
- 28. In all competitive classes, teachers and instructors must not play with groups or ensembles, except at Elementary or Intermediate level of bands and orchestras, where one non-pupil may play in order to allow a group to perform.
- 29. a) Competitors **MUST** report to the Stewards before commencement of their class.
- b) Competitors failing to appear when called upon will forfeit their right to take part in the particular competition, subject to a right to appeal to the Festival Office and, if opportunity can be found, they will be allowed to compete.
- 30. In the event of a tie in any Solo Class, the Adjudicator may, at his discretion, ask competitors concerned to perform part or all of either or both Test Pieces.
- 31. ADJUDICATORS' decisions shall in all cases be final must not be approached with queries or comments regarding their decisions. Such queries or comments should be addressed to the Alison Duthie, in writing (Reg.8). 32. ADJUDICATORS' NOTES should be collected by competitors at the close of the class or session at which they have performed.

TROPHIES/CERTIFICATES

- 33. **CERTIFICATES** will be awarded as follows: Honours Certificates to all entrants who gain not less than 90%, First Class Certificates to all entrants who gain not less than 85% and Certificates of Merit to all entrants who gain not less than 80%. Competitors are asked to collect Certificates from their warm-up area, at the end of the Class or Session at which they have performed.
- 34. No Trophy or Prize will be awarded unless the competitor receives an average of 85%, unless otherwise stated. 35. Where trophies are awarded, they are held for the ensuing year only and must be returned to Cairncross Ltd., Jewellers, 18 St. John Street, Perth by 31st January 2021. A responsible adult will be required to sign a receipt and give an undertaking to keep the Trophy safe and to return it in good condition.

ENGRAVING

36. Any engraving MUST be done by Cairncross Ltd., 18 St John Street, PERTH, at the winner's expense.

PHOTOGRAPHY & RECORDING

37. Photography, including digital photography, and recording, either audio or video, are not permitted during performances, other than by official festival photographers or by Press photographers. All mobile devices must be switched off during performances.

Parents/teachers/leaders are reminded that they are responsible for the conduct and safety of school-age competitors in their charge.

It is not in the spirit of the festival movement for competitors or their supporters to pass comment, whether it is directed at a competitor or at the adjudicator.

Please be aware that silence during competition makes it fair for all performers.

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare.

The purpose of the policy:

- to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children of festival members
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm

We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:

- valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and volunteers
- recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training.

The Federation will review this policy each year in November in line with Safe Network guidance or sooner in light of any changes in legislation or guidance. All changes will be communicated to our member Festivals in time for the start of the new Festival year.

The purpose of the policy:

- to provide protection for vulnerable adults at risk who participate in our festivals,
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a vulnerable adult may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm
- to actively promote the empowerment and well-being of vulnerable adults who participate in our festivals

We will seek to safeguard vulnerable adults at risk by:

- valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- adopting safe working practices for staff and volunteers
- recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information appropriately about adults who are at risk, with their consent
- if consent is refused and there are considered to be serious concerns of abuse for the individual concerned or others, then consent may be over ridden in line with guidance, and only shared appropriately with those who need to know
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training

The Federation will review this policy each year in November or sooner in light of any changes in legislation or guidance. All changes will be communicated to our member Festivals in time for the start of the new Festival year.

Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone

The Federation and its member Festivals use the following policies and procedures to create **Safer Festivals** for everyone:

- 1. A single, definitive Child Protection Policy and a Vulnerable Adults at Risk Protection Policy adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 2. One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officers (FSO) appointed for each Federation Festival.
- 3. Name: Lynsey Paterson Phone: 07723 436130
- 4. Best practice advice in the form of **Safe Working Practice** and **Festival Child Protection leaflets**, with support and training for all Festival staff and volunteers. Including clear reporting procedures for anyone with a concern about a child or a vulnerable adult.
- 5. Appropriate recruitment and induction procedures for all new Festival staff and volunteers responsible for providing safe environments for everyone attending / performing at a Federation Festival.
- 6. All Festival personnel wear a coloured lanyard with a photographic identity badge. All teachers/parents/guardians/carers are asked to report all incidents of any nature to anyone wearing a Yellow or Blue lanyard with their identity badge. All reported incidents will be handled in accordance with the **Safe Working Practice** and **Festival Child Protection** best practice advice. In addition we will ensure the availability of a quiet area / room where concerns can be expressed in private.
- 7. For the duration of the Festival, all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are responsible for the continuous care and supervision of their own children/pupils/vulnerable adults. If they are unable to attend personally, they must delegate their responsibilities to an identified adult and ensure that their children/pupils/vulnerable adults are aware of the identity and name of the person responsible for their care. This includes supervision throughout all Festival venues, performance, practice and changing areas that may be provided.
- 8. No unauthorised photography, audio or video recording is allowed at our Festivals. Where parents/guardians/carers do not wish photos to be taken at all, then the responsible adult attending should ensure that their child/pupil/vulnerable adult is not included in official authorised photos.
- 9. Some children and vulnerable adults may have specific needs in order to take part. If this is the case we ask the responsible teachers/parents/guardians/carers to contact the Festival Secretary prior to arrival. The Festival actively seeks wherever possible to meet these needs, but must know beforehand in order to prepare support or to advise that help cannot be provided on this occasion.
- 10. The Festival's Child Protection Policy, Vulnerable Adults at Risk Protection Policy and approach to Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone is published explicitly in our Syllabus and Programme. By completing and signing the entry form all parents / guardians / carers and teachers of entrants under 18 (or vulnerable adults of any age) confirm that they give (or have obtained) the necessary consents for the entrants to take part in the Festival. Without consent the entry to the Festival cannot be accepted.
